3 Credits (free elective)

Pre-/co-requisites: LANG 1133 is open to UST undergraduates of Chinese language background (including exchange students) and for complete beginners only. This course is restricted to students with Chinese language backgrounds but have no prior knowledge in the Cantonese dialect. No pre-requisites and co-requisites are required.

Course Description

LANG 1133 is a credit-bearing Cantonese elective course for UST undergraduates of Chinese language background. It equips students with Cantonese communicative competence necessary for living and net-working in Hong Kong, thus facilitating their smooth integration into the local community. The learning activities involve developing students' listening and speaking skills in an attempt to build learners' confidence and fluency in using Cantonese for daily communication. Students attend three hours of class and complete up to six hours of out-of-class work per week. The course is offered in Fall and Spring semesters.

7. Develop ideas clearly and fully.
8. Organize ideas coherently, ensuring logical flow and focused development from sentence to text level.

Shows a strong sense of self-reflection, cooperative learning, and problem-solving initiatives.
C	Satisfactory Performance	Demonstrates abilities to use Cantonese, some non-verbal communication, and adequate written Chinese to complete discourses, which are based on some capacity for critical thinking, information analysis and synthesis. Shows persistence and effort to achieve broadly defined learning goals.
D	Marginal Pass	Shows a certain level of ability to use Cantonese to do simple communication. Has the potential to further develop Cantonese proficiency, awareness of communication, and/or learning motivation and attitude.
F	Fail	Demonstrates insufficient understanding of the course content and requirements. Shows very limited abilities in the Cantonese and/or lack of effort towards achieving learning goals.
